- ⁴ Subject to having completed a total of 30 credits of Chinese in Year 1 and Year 2, students may spend either two semesters studying at a partner institution in China or Taiwan, or one semester in China or Taiwan (study at partner institution) and one semester in a country of a second language studied in Year 1 and Year 2 (study at partner institution or work placement). All courses taken during Year 3 will be assessed by the approved host university. Please note that work placements in China, Taiwan, Japan and Korea will not initially be available.
- ⁵ In addition to general regulations for passing the year, students must pass CH3019 Chinese Language (Mandarin) Level 3
- ⁶ In addition to general regulations for passing the year, students must pass CH3021.
- ⁴ Chinese cannot be studied as a 10-credit subject for students who have spent and passed Third Arts (World Languages) studying in China.
- ⁸ Students who have not taken Chinese in Year 1 or Year 2 may take it as a new subject in Year 4, subject to timetable constraints
