# LLM (INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY AND E-LAW)

## **Overview**

The LLM (Intellectual Property and e-Law) is a full-time programme running for 12 months or a part-time programme running for 24 months. A full-time candidate may not, during the currency of the LLM (Intellectual Property and e-Law), simultaneously pursue any other form of education, training or employment, without the advance permission of the School of Law.

## **Presentation of Dissertation/Submission Dates**

The dissertation must be submitted for examination at the Winter Board, on a date in September to be specified by the School of Law at the commencement of the programme.

### **Exit Awards**

#### Postgraduate Certificate in Law and Technology

Upon successful completion of taught modules to the value of 30 credits that meet the requirements of the Postgraduate Certificate in Law and Technology (https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/programmes/pclt/), students may opt not to proceed with the programme and exit with a Postgraduate Certificate in Law and Technology (https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/programmes/pclt/) (NFQ Level 9, Minor Award).

#### Postgraduate Diploma in Law (Intellectual Property and e-Law)

Upon successful completion of taught modules to the value of 60 credits, registered LLM (Intellectual Property and e-Law) (p. 1) students may opt not to proceed with the programme and exit with a Postgraduate Diploma in Law (Intellectual Property and e-Law) (https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/programmes/pdlipe/) (NFQ Level 9, Major Award).
