## Exit Award only

Candidates on the MA (Celtic Civilisation) (<https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/programmes/macciv/>) programme who pass at least **30** credits of taught modules (to include CC6001 or CC6011) may opt to exit the programme and be awarded a Postgraduate Certificate in Celtic Civilisation. A student who subsequently applies to continue to a Master's must do so within 5 years of successful completion of the Postgraduate Certificate.
