

# POSTGRADUATE DIPLOMA IN LAW (BUSINESS LAW)

## Overview

### NFQ Level 9, Major Award

The Postgraduate Diploma in Law (Business Law) is a full-time programme running for 9 months or a part-time programme running for 18 months over two academic years from the date of first registration for the programme. A full-time candidate may not, during the currency of the Postgraduate Diploma in Law (Business Law), simultaneously pursue any other form of education, training or employment, without the advance permission of the School of Law.

## Progression: LLM (Business Law)

Candidates who successfully complete the Postgraduate Diploma in Law (Business Law) may undertake the LLM (Business Law) (<https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/programmes/llmbl/>).

## Programme Requirements

**Full-time:** Students take **60** credits over one academic year.

**Part-time:** Students take **60** credits over two academic years, completing a total of **30** credits (including LW6646) in Year 1 and **30** credits in Year 2.
