POSTGRADUATE DIPLOMA IN LAW (INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY AND E-LAW)

Overview

NFQ Level 9, Major Award

The Postgraduate Diploma in Law (Intellectual Property and e-Law) is a full-time programme running for 9 months or a part-time programme running for 18 months over two academic years from the date of first registration for the programme. A full-time candidate may not, during the currency of the Postgraduate Diploma in Law (Intellectual Property and e-Law), simultaneously pursue any other form of education, training or employment, without the advance permission of the School of Law.

Progression: LLM (Intellectual Property and e-Law) Degree

Candidates who successfully complete the Postgraduate Diploma in Law (Intellectual Property and e-Law) may undertake the LLM (Intellectual Property and e-Law) Degree (https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/ programmes/llmipe/).

Exit Award

Postgraduate Certificate in Law and Technology

Upon successful completion of taught modules to the value of 30 credits that meet the requirements of the Postgraduate Certificate in Law and Technology (https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/programmes/ pclt/), students may opt not to proceed with the programme and exit with a Postgraduate Certificate in Law and Technology (https://ucc-iepublic.courseleaf.com/programmes/pclt/) (NFQ Level 9 Minor Award).
