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# **POSTGRADUATE DIPLOMA IN PALLIATIVE CARE (NOT ON OFFER UNTIL 2024/25)**

### Overview

The Postgraduate Diploma in Palliative Care is a part-time, blended learning programme, which includes a clinical placement. The programme runs over two academic years (18 months) from first registration for the Postgraduate Certificate in Palliative Care.

#### Notes:

- Entry to the programme is only via the Postgraduate Certificate in Palliative Care (https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/programmes/ pcpc/). All students will be registered for the Postgraduate Certificate in Palliative Care in the first instance.
- · In accordance with UCC's policy on Recognition of Prior Learning, a student who has successfully completed modules for Continuous Professional Development within the Postgraduate Diploma in Palliative Care programme, may apply for exemptions for modules taken within the previous five years.

# Progression to the MSc in Palliative Care (NFQ Level 9, **Major Award)**

Following successful completion of the Postgraduate Diploma in Palliative Care, a student may progress to the MSc (Palliative Care) (https://ucc-ie-public.courseleaf.com/programmes/mscpc/), with exemptions granted for modules already taken in the Postgraduate Certificate and the Postgraduate Diploma within the previous 5 years.
